(19th cohort) Program Guidance for AY 2023-2024 enrollment

Last updated: 9/18/2024

This guidance applies to students of the Program in Economic and Public Policy 19th Cohort for academic years 2023, 2024 and 2025.

1. Academic Calendar

Each module comes in 5 weeks. Each semester consists of module A, module B, module C, and recess. Many courses are offered in modules A and B. Intensive courses are offered in module C and recess.

2. Course requirements

In Tsukuba, 1 credit corresponds to 10 lectures (75 min. per lecture). Students are required to earn at least 30 credits by taking courses including mandatory courses to fulfill a partial requirement for earning a Master of International Public Policy.

All required courses are shown in Table 1 and Table 2 (below).

Note: In order to graduate, there is a minimum credit requirement of 30 credits, however:

- 1. There are 6 categories of courses to take, <u>each of which has its own minimum credit requirement, which must be met in order to graduate</u> <u>successfully</u> (i.e. Successfully attaining 30 credits does not necessarily mean you meet the requirements to graduate. For example, a total of 30 credits which does not include 1 unit from 'Graduate General Education Courses' (orange), would not meet graduation requirements).
- 2. 20 of the 30 units must come by gaining units from across different course categories, with the *minimum unit requirement of each category represented above by the colored rectangles*.

Notes:

1. Courses with • (Research Workshop on International Public Policy A and Research Workshop on International Public Policy B) are mandatory.

2. In order to have credits from Research Workshop on International Public Policy A, students need to take and have credits from the following courses: Statistics, Data Management, Advanced Data Management, and Seminar on Economics 1.

3. In order to have credits from Research Workshop on International Public Policy B, students need to have credits from Seminar on Economics II and Seminar on Economics III, and must also pass a preliminary examination. In order to pass the preliminary examination, students need to pass both the master's thesis mid-term oral defence and the written examinations that test the knowledge of courses marked \bigstar . Students who took and have credit from all courses with \bigstar and from 3 of the 5 courses marked \blacksquare are exempt from those written exams. For Development Economics I and Development Economics II, we count those two courses as one course. The content of exams are the content of those courses with \bigstar . Note that even if students are exempt from the written exams of the preliminary examination, students still need to pass the mid-term oral defence of the master's thesis.

4. Courses marked as 🛪 are mandatory for both Research Workshop on International A and B, as explained above.

5. Courses with \Box can be counted towards fulfillment of the 30 credits requirement (up to 10 credits).

6. Courses with * are cross-listed with undergraduate courses.

7. A course with ** is mandatory except for students who pass the placement test. Those who want to take the placement test need to report to the deputy director within the first week of October.

8. For courses with ©, JICA requests JICA scholars to take these two courses as Mandatory courses.

9. For courses with , students need to pass 3 out of 5 courses in order to exempt themselves from the written exam, which is one of the requirements of the preliminary examination.

3. Course Registration

Course registration must be completed on TWINS during the designated registration period, usually in the first two weeks of each semester. For Fall AB courses (first semester), the deadline is <u>Monday, October 16</u>. After this date, you are not allowed to cancel any course registration.

4. Language courses

Special Japanese language courses may be offered for PEPP scholars later in the year. In principle, attendance is mandatory.

5. Lunch seminar

As part of Seminar on Economics I, II, and III, we hold a lunch seminar on Monday in the 3rd period (11:40~) in module AB each semester for the first three semesters. Lunch seminar is a key forum for students to present, exchange, and discuss their research progress. All students at various stages present their research work and discuss others' work. Attendance is mandatory. Specific instructions and a schedule will be provided at the beginning of each semester. Your goal in the first year's lunch seminar is to develop a good research proposal for your master thesis, based on which your advisors are determined (see 7. Advisors).

6. Master thesis

As part of the requirements for earning an M.A. in International Public Policy, students are required to submit and successfully defend a master's thesis. A complete draft must be submitted mid-May in the second year, followed by a preliminary oral defense later the same month. A final copy must be submitted in early-July, followed by a final oral defense in late-July or early-August. Specific instructions and a schedule will be announced in the second year.

7. Advisors

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In the first year, each student is *randomly* assigned an advisor for administrative purposes. Your first-year advisor does not supervise your research. Finding advisors for your thesis research is your responsibility. Your goal in the first year is to find 'good' advisors while completing course work, contributing to lunch seminars, and interacting with professors.

In January, you are required to submit the names of your main advisor and two sub-advisors of your choice along with your research proposal. You must choose a main advisor from the PEPP faculty. Sub-advisors are also commonly chosen from them. If you prefer to choose other sub-advisors, you should ask a program officer about the rules and necessary procedures. (You need to receive prior approval from a professor.)

We determine each student's advisors based on students' research interests/projects and their academic performance in the first year (the balance of advising duties among faculty members is another factor considered). Students may be assigned advisors other than their choice. If your academic performance is not satisfactory, you will not be able to continue to the second year of your master's program, and no advisors will be assigned to you; this also means you cannot submit a master's thesis in your second year.

8. Grades
